Rotary Zones 26 & 27 consist of 30 Rotary Districts located in the western United States and Canada.

Around the globe, Rotary is divided into 34 geographic zones, which are grouped into pairs. Each Rotary International Director represents two of these "paired" zones, serving a two-year term on the Rotary Board of Directors.

The primary focus of Zones 26 & 27 is to support the work being done by our 30 Districts, representing more than 1700 clubs and 67,000 Rotary members.

Steve BenderPresident, Rotary Club of Newport Beach



Steve Bender is the President and founder of the Rotary Club of Newport Beach; he is the D- 5320 Environmental Chair and Past President of the Rotary Club of Newport Beach Sunrise. He also chairs the Rotary Zone 26-27 water conference, "Source to Sea." He was part of the Sustainability Leadership Program's Advisory Board at the University of California-Irvine, was President of the Newport Bay Conservancy, and appointed to Vanguard University's "Ethics in America" Board. Steve was a founding Director for the US Green Chamber and Co-Founder of Rotary's Global Climate Pledge program. Steve sits on the board of the Rotary Climate Action Team (RCAT) Network, he is the D5320 Director of Environmental and Sustainability Rotary Action Group and travels the globe speaking to Rotary clubs, promoting, and educating members on environmental issues and projects. Steve is the CEO of Sea 2 Sky Solutions, a consulting company based in Newport Beach, CA and Bocas del Toro, Panama.

Andy BarnettCo-Chair, Water Source to Sea



Andy Barnett is the past president of the Garberville Rotary Club in District 5130, California's north coast region. Living in Humboldt County's redwood country, he has been a homesteader, forest activist, avid kayaker, and community advocate for 40 years. A professional musician and educator, Andy sees the underlying harmony and counterpoint implicit in the 4 Way Test.

He gladly adds his voice to the many challenges facing Rotary in our new area of focus, the path of earth stewardship. His inspiration is Alexander Von Humboldt, his region's namesake, and the original ecologist, who discovered 2 centuries ago that "All living systems are interconnected and mutually dependent." For the Source to Sea Summit, Andy presents guests who will speak about the watersheds, river valleys, and forests that provide all living things with the substance which makes Earth what it is, our Water Planet home.

The Snake River is a primary watercourse in the greater Columbia River watershed. Vice Chairman Wheeler of the Nez Perce Tribe and Congressman Simpson (R- Idaho) have forged an alliance to protect the Snake River salmon and all the inhabitants along Snake River shores.

They will speak of their cooperative efforts, their friendship, and the challenges of finding common ground on the path of stewardship and mutual respect. Their long term goal is the removal of dams along the Snake River.

Eel River Recovery Project



Pat Higgins is a tireless advocate and frontline researcher promoting the health and ongoing recovery of the Eel River watershed in Northern California. The Eel, a federally designated Wild and Scenic River, has been impacted for decades by wave after wave of natural and human-induced impacts from 100-year floods to rampant logging and water extraction. Pat spends countless hours up close and personal with the rocks, pools, and fish of the Eel. He will speak on how citizens, governments, native tribes, and the Rotary family can, in unity, embrace the beauty and challenge of waterways across the West.

Michael Furniss is broadly educated and experienced in a variety of subjects, including soil science, watershed management, forest ecology, and climate change mitigation and adaptation. He worked for the research and development branch of the US Forest Service for 33 years. He teaches the upper-division/graduate "Climate Change and Land Use" course at Humboldt Polytechnic University (CA). Michael recently led a team of 36 earth scientists and fish biologists in writing and publishing: "Water, Climate Change, and Forests", a high-profile national publication on the intersection of these issues and resources. He will speak on the deep connections between forests, wetlands, waterways, biodiversity. And human survival.

He started in his own watershed, hauling trash out of Mendocino's Russian River. Lori Cloutier

Co-Leader, ESRAG Plastic Solutions Task Force



Lori Cloutier serves as a Co-Leader of the Plastic Solutions Task Force, a part of Rotary's Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group. The task force is working to address root causes of plastic pollution, and to help develop a global network to rethink and influence how we create, use and dispose of plastic.

She served as Executive Director of the Rotary Club of Oakland for 25 years. Today, she is a "civilian" member of the Poulsbo Rotary Club and created the Trash Talk Task Force in 2018. The Poulsbo Club has diverted more than 40,000 lbs. of plastic from landfill to become composite decking through Trex Company, Inc. Unfortunately, even as that collection work took place, more than 11,000 million tons, per year, of other plastics entered the ocean.

Climate Advocate, Rotarian and Business Advisor



John is a business advisor and personal coach with eVo Associates in Mill Valley, California. Over four decades, he has worked with hundreds of companies and their management team, as well as thousands of team leaders and individual contributors. The focus of his work has been on enhancing team and individual performance, which equates to workplace equity and corporate sustainability. John has captured his experience in various magazine articles and books about building high performance teams and the crisis of leadership in the 21st century. John is a past president of the Rotary Club of San Francisco, the second oldest Rotary club in the world, and is an active Climate Reality Project leader. His interest in the environment has been lifelong, following in the family footsteps of his namesake and great great uncle, George Bird Grinnell, founder of the Audubon Society and father of Glacier National Park. From a young age, John was an advocate for conservation, recycling and composting.

As a result of his life-long interest in giving back, John's special focus on the climate crisis has led to an active role in promoting education and action within the worldwide Rotary community. He is working with fellow Rotarians to build a network – the Rotary Climate Action Team (RCAT) Network – of clubs focused on taking action and sharing project results. John has spoken at a number of U.S. and international venues on the climate crisis, its practical economic realities, and the various solutions any group can undertake. But most of all, John speaks to the timely need for all of us to step up to address this existential crisis for our families, our communities and those who, by circumstance, are less fortunate.

Jon Kaufman

International Director with the Rotary Club of Colorado Springs



Jon Kaufman joined Rotary 13 years ago to disrupt the way water was being provided to the most impoverished in the developing world. His project, H2OpenDoors, has since installed 36 water purification plants in 15 countries. The project has also taken over 550 Rotarians and friends on these expeditions that combine service and soulful adventure. Global Water First is this work on steroids. As the CEO, Jon has formed a team to gather investment for even greater impact. The ambition is to create 1000 water enterprises in the next 5 years, most run by women. Innovative funding and technology is at work today thanks to the Water Warriors. Jon lives in Colorado Springs and is International Director with the Rotary Club of Colorado Springs. He also serves as a steward on the Council for Inclusive Capitalism at the Vatican.

Captain Paul Watson

Co-Founder Greenpeace, Founder Sea Shepard



Captain Paul Watson is our keynote speaker. He is one of the world's leading conservation and environmental activists. He transformed the state of global environmental activism, issue communication, and policy through his innovative leadership. Most notably, Captain Watson was a cofounder of Greenpeace and the founder of the Sea Shepherd Conservation Society. Sea Shepherd is an international direct-action ocean conservation movement that has worked tirelessly since 1977 to conserve and protect the world's ocean from illegal exploitation and environmental destruction. Their work was featured on the television series "Whale Wars." Most recently, Captain Watson has co-founded the Church of Biocentrism and founded the Captain Paul Watson Foundation. He is the author of many novels.


